Day 1 Arrival Japan: **US – Tokyo**

Upon arrival in Tokyo, your Guest Services Representative will be waiting to assist you through immigration and customs and forward to baggage claim, where you will meet your

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private English-speaking Driver. Your luggage will be managed and you will be transferred to your hotel.

Upon arrival at the Palace Hotel, you will be met by the concierge who will welcome you with a VIP check-in experience. Your luggage will be managed and delivered to your accommodation.

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Day 2 Japan: Tokyo

After lunch, you will have the opportunity of discovering with your guide, Tokyo's world-class art galleries.

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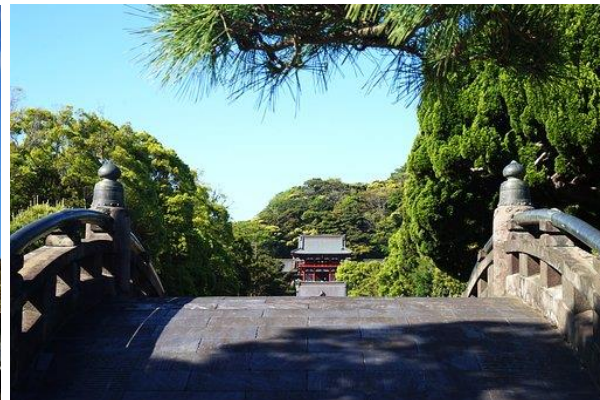


After your Museum tours conclude you will be returned to your hotel, where you will be at leisure for the remainder of the day.

ALTERNATIVES FOR TODAY'S TOURS:

A day trip outside Tokyo to Kamakura or Nikko.

One of Japan's former capitals, Kamakura is a seaside home to ancient shrines, temples, and the Daibutsu, a bronze Buddha that stands at 13-meter tall.



Nikko lies in a northern mountainous region, and you can visit the Toshogu Shrine complex and the Tamozawa Imperial Villa.

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At the appropriate time this evening, you will meet your private English-speaking professional local guide in the lobby of your hotel, for **guided Japanese food crawl**. The izakaya is a type of Japanese bar in which a variety of small, typically inexpensive, dishes and snacks are served to accompany the alcoholic drinks. like a They have been compared to Irish pubs, tapas bars and early American saloons and taverns.

Veer off into the maze of laneways that fill the capital, sampling barbecued meats and sweet desserts, before you enter an izakaya for a distinctly Japanese experience.

These small pubs are popular gathering places for an after-work beer, and traditional izakaya favorites like chicken wings and cold edamame are served as tapas.



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After the Food Crawl, you will be returned to your hotel, where you are at leisure for the remainder of the evening. **You may select to remain in the city on your own to continue to explore. You would make your own way back to the hotel.

Day 4 Japan: Tokyo - Hakone



Breakfast in the hotel (Included in your package).

After Breakfast, you will check out of your hotel and meet your private English-speaking Driver & professional local guide in the lobby of the hotel for your transfer to Hakone.

Upon arrival in the mountain town of Hakone, you will see Mount Fuji looming above the lake with the famous hot springs dotted amid the hills. You will arrive at the base of the cable car station and a cable car will deliver you to the hot mountain springs where



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the hard-boiled eggs are said to add seven years to your life.



Lunch is in town on your own today (payment at time of service direct to the restaurant).



After Lunch you will continue on to the Hakone Gardens.



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After the tour, you will be transferred to your hotel Suitably rejuvenated you'll sleep like a baby on the comfy futons of a traditional ryokan (inn) with exceptional views.
Dinner is on your own tonight.

Day 5 Japan: **Hakone – Takayama**



Breakfast in the hotel (Included in your package).

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After Breakfast, meet your private English-speaking Driver & professional local guide in the lobby of the hotel for your morning trip to another onsen (hot-spring bath).

After your hot springs experience, you will be returned to your hotel, where you will check out and continue with your English-speaking private driver to the train station to meet your train for a 3 day scenic train journey.

Meet your train to begin your scenic train journey. The train meanders through mountains and gorges to reach the venerable city of Takayama.



Takayama, a small town situated in the Hida Alpine region of Gifu Prefecture. Wander through Takayama's shitamachi, the Old Town is criss-crossed with narrow streets lined with Edoera centuries old merchant houses.

Stop at one of the famous sake breweries for a taste of the local drop and try the famous Hida beef sushi.

Lunch & Dinner are on board the train today. **Accommodations** are on board the train tonight.

Day 6 Japan: Takayama



Breakfast on the train (Included in your package).

After Breakfast, meet your private English-speaking professional local guide at the station and continue to explore Takayama at your own pace.

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This morning, you will visit The Miyagawa morning market. It is ideal for browsing fresh produce, pickles and crafts.

Afterwards, take a peek inside the heritage houses, many of which are open to the public.



Nearby, UNESCO-listed Shirakawago is a real glimpse of the past - a historic silk-farming village of thatched Gassho-style houses.

Lunch is on your own today. Your guide will offer suggestions for dining in Shirakawago. After your tour you will return to the train to continue on your trip forward to Hiroshima.

Dinner is on board the train today.

Accommodations are on board the train tonight.

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Day 7 Japan: Takayama - Hiroshima

Breakfast on the train (Included in your package).

After Breakfast, you are at leisure to relax and enjoy the train ride. The views are fantastic as you descend the mountains by train to reach Hiroshima.

Upon arrival in Hiroshima, meet your private English-speaking guide at the train station and continue to your hotel, Sheraton Grand Hiroshima Hotel.

Upon arrival at the hotel, you will be met by the concierge who will welcome you with a private VIP check-in experience. Your luggage will be managed and delivered to your accommodation.



After check-in, you will meet your English-speaking professional local guide in the lobby of the hotel for a tour of The Peace Memorial Park. This park was created on land destroyed by the atomic bomb in 1945. The skeleton of a building provides a poignant reminder of the city's past tragedies and its inspiring regeneration.

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Hiroshima, a modern city on Japan's Honshu Island, was largely destroyed by an atomic bomb during World War II.

Today, Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park commemorates the 1945 event. In the park are the ruins of Genbaku Dome, one of the few buildings that was left standing near ground zero.

It is dedicated to the legacy of Hiroshima as the first city in the world to suffer a nuclear attack, and to the memories of the bomb's direct and indirect victims.



The Hiroshima Peace Memorial, originally the Hiroshima Prefectural Industrial Promotion Hall, and now commonly called the Genbaku Dome, Atomic Bomb Dome or A-Bomb Dome, is part of the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park.

This site was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1996. The ruin of the hall serves as a memorial to the people who were killed in the atomic bombing of Hiroshima on 6 August 1945.

Over 70,000 people were killed instantly, and another 70,000 suffered fatal injuries from the radiation.



Lunch is en-route today. Your guide will recommend options for dining in Hiroshima in the area.

Other prominent sites include Shukkei-en, a formal Japanese garden, and Hiroshima Castle, a fortress surrounded by a moat and a park.

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Next you will visit the Hiroshima Castle.

Hiroshima Castle, sometimes called Carp Castle, was a castle in Hiroshima, Japan that was the home of the daimyō of the Hiroshima han.

The castle was constructed in the 1590s. After the Meiji Restoration, the castle came to serve as a military facility, and the Imperial General Headquarters was based there during the First Sino-Japanese War in 1894–1895, but it was destroyed by the atomic bombing on August 6, 1945.

Today, Contemporary recreation of a destroyed 16th-century castle, offering a history museum & spectacular city views.

After visiting the Castle, you will continue just a little East to the Shukkei-en, a formal Japanese garden. Shukkeien can be translated to mean “shrunken-scenery garden” and that is exactly what it represents. Imposing mountains, deep valleys, lush forests, and scenic lakes are all miniaturized and have been carefully cultivated over the centuries.

Dating back to 1620, the Shukkeien can be considered the quintessential Japanese-style garden. The vegetation lends itself well to natural landscapes, and is a joy to walk around. Dotted with teahouses and tranquil lakes, it is difficult to take a bad photo here!



After the tour, you will be returned to your hotel where you are at leisure for the remainder of the day.

After Breakfast, you will meet your private English-speaking driver & professional local guide in the lobby of your hotel, for a full day tour of Hiroshima.



Lunch today is a really unique experience, that Hiroshima does better than any place else in Japan.

Inside Japan's **BRETT PLOTZ** Blog tells us all about Hiroshima's most famous dish, *okonomiyaki*? Very loosely described as a savory pancake, this Japanese delight contains an eclectic variety of

ingredients, all working together to create a unique and delicious treat. Squid, cabbage, pork, egg, noodles, sauces – really anything you want!

Fiercely proud of their layered-style of *okonomiyaki*, every resident of Hiroshima will tell you the best tasting *okonomiyaki* in the world comes from, of course, Hiroshima. I have yet to disagree.

For a great *okonomiyaki* experience, you will head down to Okonomimura. Okonomimura is basically a food theme park, the ramshackle building housing over 20 different *okonomiyaki* restaurants all competing for your patronage. A very unique and memorable place to try the local delicacy!

After lunch, you will continue the tour to visit one of Hiroshima's most intriguing sites. The

Itsukushima

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Itsukushima, also known as Miyajima, is a small island in Hiroshima Bay, western Japan. It is known for its forests and ancient temples.

Just offshore, the giant, orange Great Torii Gate is partially submerged at high tide. It marks the entrance to the Itsukushima Shrine, which was first built in the 12th century.

Nearby, the Museum of History and Folklore has cultural artifacts in a 19th-century merchant's home.

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A 10 minute ferry ride will deliver you to sacred Miyajima, known as Shrine Island. Itsukushima Shrine's torii gate seems to float on water, while the Five Tier Pagoda soars skywards.

The slopes here are a riot of colour from cherry trees and maples in spring and autumn. Sparsely populated and intensely rural, Miyajima is renowned throughout the country as being the best spot to see the autumn leaves change colors.

The island's many maple trees are turned a brilliant crimson in the fall, making it a top attraction for those looking to snap that perfect picture. And because the island itself is sacred, the trees are protected and cannot be cut. This protection also extends to the tame deer roaming the island, a sacred animal considered to be friends of the gods.

First established in the 6th century, the present shrine dates back almost 500 years and boasts one of Japan's official Three Greatest Views. Because the shrine was built over the water, with stick-like structures lofting it above the sea floor, the entire shrine looks to be floating. Depending on whether the tide is in or out, your views of the surrounding area will change. This beguiling shrine and the surrounding pagodas, temples, and extant buildings, is a great place to visit.

Afterwards, a cable car up Mount Misen affords you magnificent sunset views over the islands of the Inland Sea.

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After your tour, you will be returned to your hotel, where you will be at leisure for the remainder of the evening.

Day 9/ Japan: Hiroshima – Kyoto

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Breakfast in the hotel (Included in your package)

After Breakfast, you will meet your private English-speaking driver in the lobby of your hotel, for your transfer to the train station, where you will meet your train for Kyoto.

The Shinkansen bullet train will have you in Kyoto in no time.

Japan's former capital is arguably its most intoxicating city. This is the place to get to grips with Japan's unique culture.

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At the house of a Japanese tea ceremony master you can get to grips with the long history of this ritual, and you can also learn more about Zen Buddhism and the art of wearing a kimono.

After getting dressed in your kimono by your host, the tea master will teach you the dos and don'ts during the ceremony as well as the proper way of drinking the tea.



Traditional tea ceremony

The ritual of preparing and drinking tea lies at the heart of Japanese culture. Clad in a traditional Kimono, you'll receive instruction from a tea master and sample revitalizing teas.

Afterwards you will be entertained with a geisha & Maiko Dance.

After your tea ceremony experience, you will visit the Nijo Castle. Nijo Castle is a flatland castle in Kyoto, Japan. The castle consists of two concentric rings of fortifications, the Ninomaru Palace, the ruins of the Honmaru Palace, various support buildings and several gardens.

Nijo Castle is a must-see here, surrounded by stunning gardens, and the formal rock gardens of the Daitoku-ji Zen temple complex is perfect for relaxing in.

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Flatland-mountain castles

As territory became unified by the daimyo of the Warring States period, and as vassals and commercial and industrial men began living in larger groups, the strategic point of the hill castles became insufficient. The Low hills or the hilly areas of plains areas at the foot of mountains where there were wide plains were chosen, and it became common for castles to be constructed into castle towns.

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The Names of the Buildings that make up a castle in Japan.

Kuruwa (compounds)

Subsections in the castle partitioned according to role and function.

Honmaru (inner citadel)

The compound in the center of the castle was where the headquarters were located during times of war. In castles from the period from the end of the Azuchi-Momoyama period until the Edo period it was usually prepared as the castle lord's residence or as the tower and palace of the government office.

Ninomaru (second citadel)

At the compound that directly defended the inner citadel, it is common to find examples the castle lord's residence built here, and it was usual for storehouses such as those for weapons and provisions to be lined up here.

Sannomaru (third citadel)

At the compound that directly defended the outer citadel and indirectly the inner citadel, in castles from the period from the end of the Azuchi-Momoyama period (1573–1603) until the Edo period it was common for the residences of vassals and riding grounds to be placed.

Other compounds

As the scale of the inner citadel grew and castles crowded the land, a small compound that acted as a strong point as a last entrenchment and as the headquarters at times of war became required.

For that purpose, a division of the inner citadel was constructed and was known, among other names, as the “tsumenomaru”, the “tsumenoshiro” or the “tenshu-kuruwa”.

Also, independent compounds within the castle known as the western citadel, the northern citadel, and the eastern citadel were arranged. In some instances a refined atmosphere like a Yamazato-maru was built for tea ceremonies. Furthermore, to protect the water supply the Mizunote-kuruwa (Ido-kuruwa) was essential.

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After your Castle tour, you will be delivered to your hotel where you will be met by the concierge with a VIP welcome and private check-in experience. Your luggage will be managed and delivered to your accommodation.

After check-in you are at leisure to relax in the hotel, or do some exploring on your own.

Day 10/ Japan: *Kyoto*

After Breakfast, you will meet your private English-speaking driver & professional local guide in the lobby of your hotel for an all day tour of Kyoto.

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Exploring Kyoto you may glimpse a geisha, wander down timeless alleys, peek into the temples, visit castles, admire gardens and rest under pavilions.



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Lunch is on your own today en-route. Your guide will offer recommendations for dining in the area.

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Dinner is on your own tonight. See Celebration Escapes Restaurant Collection for dining recommendations in Kyoto. The local restaurants serve the ever-inviting kaiseki ryori (traditional Japanese multicourse meal).

Day 11/ Japan: **Kyoto – Nara – Kyoto**

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Breakfast in the hotel (Included in your package)

After Breakfast, you will meet your private English-speaking driver & professional local guide in the lobby of your hotel for an all day tour of Nara.



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Between 710 and 784 Nara was Japan's capital, until it was moved to Kyoto.

On your day trip here you'll see Todaiji Temple which is the world's largest wooden building and home to Japan's largest Buddha. The temple originally had two large pagodas on either side of the complex, which used to be among the tallest structures of its time.



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Nara is the capital of Japan's Nara Prefecture, in south-central Honshu. The city has significant temples and artwork dating to the 8th century, when it was Japan's capital.

Deer roam in Nara Park, site of Tōdai-ji temple.

Daibutsu, Tōdai-ji's 15m-high bronze Buddha, is displayed in a large wooden hall.

On the park's east side is the Shinto shrine Kasuga Taisha, which dates to 768 A.D. and more than 3,000 lanterns.

The so-called Daibutsu is almost 15 meters high and **weighs over 500 tons**. Believe it or not, but it was finished in 752 AD and almost bankrupted Japan's economy at that time.

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Kōfuku-ji

A Complex of Buddhist temple halls & pagodas, plus an on-site museum showcasing national treasures.



Hōryū-ji Temple

One of the places you absolutely have to visit is the Hōryū-ji (Temple of the Flourishing Law). Why? Because it is the **oldest wooden building in the world**. Recent studies suggest that construction might have started as early as 670 AD!!

As fires and weather leave their toll, it is estimated that about 20 percent of the original wooden materials remain in the current building. The layout, however, and the treasures you can see within, are all from the very dawn of Japanese history.

Absolutely visit the adjacent treasure (treasure hall), where you will be able to see the world famous Kudara Kannon and other amazing artwork from a thousand years ago and more.

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Yakushi-ji (Temple of the Buddha of healing) is part of the „Historic Monuments of Ancient Nara“ protected by the UNESCO.

It's **the brightest and most colorful temple in the city** and one of my favorite landmarks. Sadly, fires reduced the complex to ashes in 972 and 1528 AD, so most the buildings tourists are able to see today are later reconstructions (only the East Pagoda still dates back to the 8th century)

There's also the delightful **Kasuga**

Taisha, Nara's most celebrated shrine, to visit before you return to Kyoto.



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Kasuga-Taisha Be here for Mantoro festival (Feb 3rd and Aug 14th), when all of the 3000 lanterns are lit. Walking through the temple area will be a beyond than magical experience during that time. the magical aura this Shinto shrine emits from its every pore makes it a favorite shrine in Nara, if not all of Japan.



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Lunch is on your own today en-route. Your guide will offer recommendations for dining in the area.



After lunch, and so many temples, you might long for a little relaxation. You will visit the **Isuien Garden.** The beautiful Japanese garden is **best visited during autumn when the maples turn red.** But truth be told, the tranquil haven and it's many tea houses will still be beautiful throughout the year.

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You will continue your day to the Nara National Museum. The Nara National Museum is one of the pre-eminent national art museums in Japan.

Located in Nara Park, is an art museum which primarily displays Japanese Buddhist art. Established in 1889, the museum retains its original building and is joined by a new wing that is connected to the original building by an underground passage.

Both wings display the museum's permanent collection, which includes Buddhist statues, paintings, scrolls and ceremonial objects mainly from Japan. The new wing also houses temporary exhibitions, including an annual exhibition every autumn of treasures from Todaiji Temple.

Kofun tombs In Nara, you will have the unique chance to see one of the megalithic tombs built between the 3rd and early 7th century AD. These are key hole shaped tombs, surrounded by a big moat, called Kofun – or ancient graves. These tombs hold the bodies of former emperors. The **Gosashi tomb** is supposedly the resting place of Empress Jingū, who ruled Japan as a regent.



Daisen Kofun, the largest of all kofun, one of many tumuli in the Mozu kofungun, Sakai, Osaka Prefecture (5th century).

In 1976, Japan stopped all foreign archaeologists from studying the tomb. In 2008, Japan allowed limited access to foreign archaeologists, but National Geographic News reported that Japan "the agency has kept access to the tombs restricted, prompting rumors that officials fear excavation would reveal bloodline links between the "pure" imperial family and Korea—or that some tombs hold no royal remains at all". The examination discovered haniwa terracotta figures.

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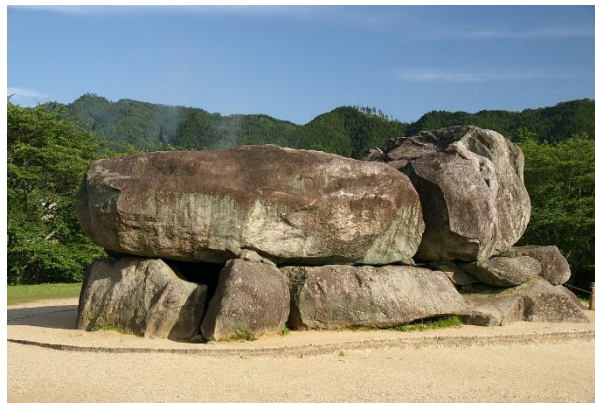


Haniwa are terracotta clay figures that were made for ritual use and buried with the dead as funerary objects during the Kofun period (3rd to 6th centuries AD) of the history of Japan.

Haniwa were created according to the *wazumi* technique, in which mounds of coiled clay were built up to shape the figure, layer by layer.



The stone chamber of Ishibutai Kofun, said to be the tomb of Soga no Umako, Asuka, Nara Prefecture (7th century)

Kabuki-za in Ginza is the principal theater in Tokyo for the traditional kabuki drama form.

There are many remarkable features of kabuki, and the existence of onnagata, the

specialists in female roles is one of them. In order to preserve itself, kabuki had to adapt throughout its long history, and since a law was passed in 1629 no real women have appeared on stage.

In their place have been specialists in female roles called onnagata, and many people from Japan and abroad



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marvel at the skill of these actors who have trained for many years to perfect this art. They are not just imitating real women! The onnagata is a special theatrical creation based on artistic convention that has developed over hundreds of years.



Another good example of kabuki's unique acting technique is the mie. This is a kind of strong pose struck by male characters in which some powerful emotion or conflict is expressed outwardly in the form of a stop-motion tableau. For greater emphasis, the pose is accompanied by loud beats of the wooden clappers. Such a pose is not realistic in any way and does not seek to be so. Instead, it is a way of embodying visually and

aurally a particular feeling, and 'presenting' it to the audience like a picture.

Invisible Men In Black



In modern business life, the word “kurogo” means someone who prompts others, but come and see where the term originated... In the stagehands dressed in black who help actors with props and costumes.

They function as support for the actors onstage, helping them to perform seamlessly, so they can always look their best.

Even during the performance you may see special staging techniques that will shock and delight you, especially in dances, the sudden onstage costume changes can be so quick that you'll wonder how they were done.

While in some plays a single actor can quick-change from one character to the next in an instant. In one famous example, a wicked priest suddenly turns into the young hero right before the audience's eyes... it's the same actor, but with a different wig, costume and props. Timed at about 3 seconds, it's the fastest quick-change in the world!
